The Greta Community Safety Group with support of the Rural City of Wangaratta, is conducting a community safety forum on

Sunday 28th October, 11.30 – 2.30pm at the Greta Hansonville Hall.

This forum will provide you with information about the upcoming fire safety risk and other emergency hazards as well providing direct access to representatives from Victoria Police, CFA, Ambulance Victoria, State Emergency Service and the Rural City of Wangaratta. Each emergency agency will be explaining their role in emergency management as it effects communities during a major event and allow for a question time.

"History clearly tells us that prepared communities respond more effectively during an event and recover more quickly afterwards."

Representatives from all community groups within the wider Greta area have received formal invitations to the forum as it is important that we build a common understanding of risk and what we can do to reduce the impact of major emergency events.



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
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ART IN THE SOUTHERN OUTSKIRTS OF BENALLA

Congratulations to Tim Butler from Tatong who won best exhibit at the Swanpool and District Scrap Art Exhibition in the Swanpool hall during the middle of August. His entry depicted a "Tin Man" made of metal scrap who is "Begging for ore along the yellow cake road." A nod to the character from the "Wizard of Oz."

The exhibition emphasises recycling and the reduction of waste as part of the modern environmental awareness. Entrant's creations have to be made from at least 75% of recycled materials and these included bread bags twined and made into carry bags, bread bag ties, my own creation using gelignite boxes, lots of metal work including barbed wire and tools etc. As a volunteer at the event I have seen very good attendances and much praise for the new form of art which follows the unavailability of the annual "Bald Archy" satirical painting exhibition. As with the Bald Archy the delicious home cooked lunch and morning and afternoon teas were hugely popular as well as lucrative for the organisers and participating clubs/groups. At this stage the exhibition will be on again next year in the same, or nearly the same, format as this year.

NEW GRANT for Shade and Shelter

We have been successful in receiving \$95 000 to fund our project Developing Climate Resilience in the Greta Valley. This is a fantastic project for our group and we are one of only 77 organisations across Australia that received funding. This grant is funded by the Federal Government's National Landcare Program, Smart Farms Small Grants initiative and will run over the next two years.

The basic objective of the project is to help farms plan for climate change, through running four Farm Gate workshops and providing incentives to establish essential shade and shelter for stock (e.g. shelterbelts and blocks of shade).

First Workshop – Managing Climate Risk in Agriculture

Workshops begin this month in Beechworth on the 25th of October, 9am – 4.30pm. This conference session is designed for landholders, with talks focusing on *climate* smart farm planning and thinking, managing

"This funding helps to support major projects in regional areas and boost community options in country towns," Ms McGowan said.

"Indi has had great success with the Building Better Regions Fund in the past. More than \$7 million has been delivered for local projects since August last year."

Eligible projects for round three need to include construction of new infrastructure, or upgrades or extensions to existing infrastructure that will provide economic and social benefits to the community.
